#### **LAWS & ANNOUNCEMENTS**

#### **New Laws**

Dec 4: Nunavut raised the base price of fuel 20 cents to \$1.40 per litre for gasoline, \$1.50 per litre for diesel and \$1.35 per litre for heating. Rates are slightly lower in Iqaluit.

#### **Cold Stress**

Dec 21: The Nunavut Chief Safety Officer officially approved the <u>code of practice</u> <u>called Thermal Conditions</u> as meeting the cold stress requirements contained in the OHS regulations.

**Action Point:** Implement an effective <u>cold stress compliance game plan</u> at your workplace

### **Workers Comp**

Nov 17: The WSCC released its <u>2023-2027 Strategic Plan</u> outlining what it wants to accomplish over the next 5 years. One of the key objectives is to reduce lost-time injury claims rates (which was 1.8 in 2021) to 1.68 per 100 workers by 2027.

#### **Workers Comp**

Feb 28: That's the deadline for Nunavut employers to submit their workers comp payroll reports and data for 2022 to WSCC without incurring 2% late fees, interest and penalties.

## **Workers Comp**

Jan 1: WSCC meal and accommodation allowances for injured workers who have to travel for medical treatment for 2023:

• Breakfast: \$29.25 (\$22.80 for Canada/US travel outside Nunavut)

• Lunch: \$35.50 (\$23.05)

• Dinner: \$94.55 (\$56.60)

• Incidentals: \$17.30 (\$17.30).
