LAWS & ANNOUNCEMENTS

Emergency Response

Sep 8: The GNWT adjusted the Evacuee Income Disruption Support (EISD) program to ensure that residents who suffered disruption to their income as a result of being forced to evacuate for more than 7 days due to the recent wildfires receive the full \$750 one-time payment. Previously, the government was applying a 10% withholding tax.

Action Point: Implement a <u>wildfire smoke protection game plan</u> at your outdoor site

New Laws

Aug 28: The GNWT announced that it will provide Evacuation Travel Support Program funding to residents who, by order, evacuated their homes by road due to wildfire of \$750 per vehicle evacuated to a southern jurisdiction and \$400 per vehicle evacuated within the NWT. Evacuees will also be eligible to register for reentry flights paid for by the government.

OHS Inspections

Sep 1: At its upcoming governance meeting, WSCC is expected to approve policy changes that affect <u>Policy 09.06</u>, which explains the methods the agency uses to carry out OHS workplace inspections using Virtual and Desktop technology.



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Action Point: Implement an <u>OHS inspections policy</u> in case inspectors show up at your door

New Laws

Aug 28: The GNWT is expanding the Support for Entrepreneurs and Economic Development (SEED) Policy to allow for contributions of up to \$5,000 to offset operational costs incurred by small businesses as a result of the recent wildfires. Businesses that have already received SEED wildfire relief funding can receive up to the \$5,000 funding limit provided that they continue to meet program criteria

New Laws

Aug 14: According to a <u>new government report</u>, the territories achieved many of its goals in boosting immigration levels from 2018 to 2022. Highlights: 363 approved Employer Driven Stream nominations, overall applications increased from 61 to 142 and applications approved rose from 28 to 105 over the same period.

New Laws

Sep 3: The GNWT completed <u>public consultations</u> on proposed changes to the *Disease Surveillance Regulations* that would update the list of reportable diseases, expand mandatory reporting of personal information for purposes of assessing risk of particular genetic diseases and create a new Chronic Disease Register.

Action Point: Use the <u>OHSI Infection Exposure Control Plan</u> template to prevent infectious illnesses at your workplace
